SCHOOL TRIP TO VENICE

After all those activities, students and teachers had lunch in the lively atmosphere of Campo Santa Margherita, one of Venice's most vibrant squares, where the guides, Silvia Simionato and Matteo Pasotto, were supposed to meet the classes for the tour starting in the afternoon.

The focus of this tour was to learn about the link between the city of Venice and some English writers and artists. Among the most fascinating writers introduced by the guides were Robert Browning and Elisabeth Barrett Browning, who left a profound impact on alltime poetry. Their story, intertwined with that of the city, offered an interesting perspective on the presence of the English people in Venice and the influence they had not only on art but also on literature. The guides also provided some curiosities about the English people that stayed in Venice for some time, such as Lord Byron, who used to take long swims along the Canal Grande to keep fit.
